Obesity carries severe welfare risks for dogs. Obese dogs have shorter lives, reduced quality of life and higher frequencies of some important conditions including arthritis, breathing problems, heart disease, diabetes and certain types of cancer.


Risk compared to crossbreeds



CONCLUSIONS:

Certain breeds, such as Pugs and Beagles, are at high risk of being overweight. Owners of these breeds should pay particular attention to their dog's bodyweight and adjust diet and exercise as necessary.

Neutered dogs are at greater risk of being overweight than entire dogs. Neutered dogs have different nutritional requirements to entire dogs. Owners should discuss diet carefully with their veterinarian.

Approximately 7% dogs are reported here as overweight, but the true number could be even higher. Owners are encouraged to routinely discuss their dog's weight and lifestyle with veterinary professionals.
