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8.	Requirements to Pass Overall and Progress to the Next Stage		
8.1.	First Sit Following scaling of the marks, a mark of 50% for the written paper (MCQ & EMQ combined) AND A result of "Competent" for each DOPS station from either the 1 st or 2 nd opportunity		
8.2.	ResitFollowing scaling of the marks, a mark of 50% for the written paper (MCQ & EMQ combined)ANDA result of "Competent" for each DOPS station from either the 1 st , 2 nd or 3 rd opportunity		
9.	Consequences of Failure		
9.1.	Candidates who do not pass Year 3 at the first attempt will be required to re-sit the item failed. (i.e. Written Paper, DOPS station (Candidates will only have to re-sit the specific DOPS station(s) that they failed)).		
9.2.	Those students graded as "Not yet competent" in any DOPS station will be given a second opportunity to gain competence in the failed station(s) at the next available sitting. Both the 1 st and 2 nd opportunities will be classed as the first attempt.		
9.3.	A candidate who fails Year 3 at the first attempt is required to take the resit or withdraw from the course.		
9.4.	The overall mark obtained at the second attempt for the Written Paper will be no greater than 50%.		
9.5.	A candidate who fails Year 3 at the second attempt will be required to withdraw from the course. S/he has a right of appeal as described in College Regulations.		
10.	Classification		
10.1.	A candidate who, at the first attempt, obtains an overall average mark of 70% or more in the Written Paper and a grade of "Competent" for each DOPS station, will be awarded a pass with Distinction.		
10.2.	A candidate who, at the first attempt, obtains an average mark of 65%-69% in the Written Paper and a grade of "Competent" for each DOPS station, will be awarded a pass with Merit.		
10.3.	A candidate who gains 40% or more overall in Year 3 will be eligible to transfer to the BSc Pre Clinical Veterinary Sciences. A pass in the DOPS is not required in order to transfer.		
11.	Disclosure of Marks		
	Results will be published by candidate number.		

12.	Absence From In-Course Assessment	
12.1.	Where a student has an <i>allowable</i> absence, s/he will be marked absent (A) from a summative assessment. Where a student has an A, and there are three or more in-course assessments in the year, the marks awarded will be the average of the other in-course assessment marks gained by the student.	
12.2.	90% of the marks for the year must be attributed to results of direct assessment i.e. no more than 10% of marks can be attributed to Absent (A) marks.	
12.3.	An allowable absence is one that is for a significant unforeseeable event such as illness.	
12.4.	Any other foreseeable absence will only be considered allowable if agreed by Academic Progress Committee (APC) and this will only apply in very strictly limited circumstances.	
12.5.	A student absent for any other reason will be awarded 0 (zero) for the assessment.
