	Exit the placement year scheme and restart studies at the start of the subsequent year
10.2.	A candidate who fails the placement year summative assessment shall be given the opportunity to resubmit. The candidate will be required to resubmit their Project Report and a new supervisor's assessment mark will be given.
	The overall average mark obtained at the second attempt shall be no greater than 40%.
10.3.	If the candidate has not completed their Reflective Oral Presentation, s/he can resit the Reflective Oral Presentation on one further occasion.
10.4.	A candidate who fails after a second attempt will be required to withdraw from the course. S/he has a right of appeal as described in the College Regulations.
