10.1.	A student is required to resit any module failed at the first attempt. In order to resit a student will retake any assessment activity failed at the first attempt.
10.2.	The mark obtained for a module at the second attempt shall be not greater than 50%
10.3.	A student who has failed the year at the second attempt and <a href="https://example.com/has.not">has not</a> previously repeated a year of study will be entitled to repeat the year. The number of attempts at assessments will be the same as for those students not repeating the year. All modules taken under the 'repeat year' rule will be capped at a maximum of a bare pass.
