VETERINARY MEDICINE AS A SECOND DEGREE FOR UK/EU STUDENTS 2019/20

This information is aimed at students who already hold a UK Honours Degree (or overseas equivalent) who are considering studying Veterinary Medicine as a second degree, either on the 4 or 5 year programme.

Tuition Fees

In 2019/20, the tuition fees charged by the RVC to UK/EU students on the graduate programme will be in line with the tuition fees charged to first degree students, approximately £9,250. The fees may increase incrementally for each year of the course approximately in line with inflation. For a student commencing the Graduate 4 year Veterinary Medicine programme in 2019/20, the amount required to cover the entire tuition fees will be approximately **£37,000 - £40,000**.

Other course related and living Costs

The first year of the 4 year course and first 2 years of the 5 year course are taught from Camden in London. The remaining years of the course are taught from Hawkshead in Hertfordshire. Although accommodation is likely to be more expensive in London, travel requirements in Hertfordshire will mean that you should budget at least between £11,000 & £13,000 per year to cover rent and other living costs, as a minimum. Statutory Support Available

Currently government regulations mean that UK students are entitled to claim a means tested Maintenance Loan only to help with living and course related costs if studying Veterinary Medicine as a second degree. The Maintenance Loan is applied for in the normal way via <u>www.gov.uk/student-finance</u>

There is however no statutory government loan available to meet the costs of tuition fees so please think carefully about how you will pay your fees before beginning the course.

Potential sources of non-statutory support

Whilst it is acknowledged that the lack of tuition fee loan will make it difficult for those without savings or other financial support to undertake the programme, below are some ideas for those wishing to look into alternative funding possibilities:
