# **NEWSLETTER**

In November-December 2020 **7545 dog owners** responded to a survey from our Pandemic Puppies team at the Royal Veterinary College (RVC). This survey ended up being the biggest of its kind and led to two scientific papers, changing how we all understand the impact on dog welfare that resulted from the COVID-19 pandemic – thank you! Since then, many of these owners who brought a puppy home between 23/3-31/12/2020 have completed further surveys as their dogs reached 21, 24 and 27 months of age – more about this on the next page.

## THE 'COST-OF-LIVING CRISIS'



This is YOUR chance to tell us about the things that are affecting you, whether it is vet bills, the cost of dog food, or anything else - we want to know.

This research will help us and other canine welfare organisations learn how to support owners like you during these potentially challenging times.

As dogs acquired between 23/3-31/12/2020 reach 36 months of age, owners are being sent a unique survey link to take part. Thank you to those that have already done so. This study is once again generously funded by **Battersea Dogs and Cats Home**.



## PANDEMIC PUPPIES®

Longitudinal (21-27 month) surveys...

- 21 month closed 26/08/22, 1010 responses
- 24 month closed 26/11/2022, 1267 responses
- 27 month closed 26/2/23, 1222 responses

We are currently writing three papers, which will be sent directly to all owners who took part, based on the 21 months data about:

- Dog health
- Dog behaviour
- The dog-owner bond

### THE LONGITUDINAL STUDY

The 21, 24 and 27 month surveys, funded by **Battersea Dogs and Cats Home**, were launched back in January 2022.
We have now finished collecting the data and have started analysis.

So far, amongst other things, we have found that 'problem behaviours' were more frequently reported at 21 months in Pandemic Puppies compared to other studies of UK dogs. The top two most frequently reported behaviours at 21 months were:

Pulling on the lead (over 67%)





Jumping up at people (over 55%)

Only 14.7% however, reported that their dogs behaviour was worse than expected, with 38.8% telling us it was actually better than expected.

## **Pandemic Puppies: The Next Generation**

In February-March 2022, **2827 owners** who brought home a puppy under the age of 16 weeks in 2021 kindly responded to a second survey from our Pandemic Puppies team at the Royal Veterinary College (RVC).

The results of this survey, which was a repeat of the survey we ran in 2020, are about to be published. We will of course share the results with you as soon as this happens.

## Pandemic Pals: Exploring Child-Dog Bonds

Overall, child mental health has been documented to have deteriorated in the UK during the pandemic, potentially as a result of social restrictions imposed during periods of lockdown. We would like to explore how acquiring a dog during these challenging times may have helped support children's mental health with funding generously provided by the **Society for Companion Animal Studies (SCAS)**.





The criteria to take part are:

- 1. Filled in one of the initial surveys, having acquired a puppy during 2019, 2020 or 2021,
- 2. Opted into further research, and
- 3. Indicated they had children in their household

Owners who meet the above three criteria have been contacted with a unique link to complete a short survey about their households' experiences of owning a dog during the pandemic.

There is a survey for both adults and children (who are currently aged 8-17 inclusive). Adults need to give their consent for their children to take part and there is an option to opt out of either survey at the very beginning. We will not be collecting any identifying information and all responses will be anonymous.

Popular Pooches: Exploring experiences of owning the UK's most popular breeds/crossbreeds

We would like to know what it's like to be the owner of some of the most popular dog breeds in the UK. We have contacted everyone who:

- 1. Filled in one of the initial surveys, having acquired a puppy during 2019, 2020 or 2021,
- 2. Opted into further research, and
- 3. Owns one of the following breeds/crossbreeds:

Cavalier King Charles Spaniel,
Cocker Spaniel (working or show),
Labrador,
Poodle (miniature/standard/toy),
Cavapoo,
Cockapoo, or
Labradoodle

to complete a short survey about their dogs health and behaviour and their experiences of owning these breeds/crossbreeds.

Once again there is an option to opt out of the survey at the very beginning.

Rowena is the "Principal Investigator" for Pandemic Puppies and is responsible for acquiring project funding, generating new research ideas, supervising students working on the project and contributing to writing up and presenting findings.





Claire owns two English Springer Spaniels, Rosie & Morse, who's favourite pastimes involve being in water and getting muddy! Claire has a PhD in Molecular Genetics and is studying for a MSc in Clinical Animal Behaviour through Edinburgh University. Claire is currently writing the 21 month behaviour paper and focusing upon the Cost-of-Living and Pandemic Pals surveys.
