

Graduate Certificate in Advanced Veterinary Nursing programme

Course Information Sheet

2026-27

Duration of the Degree

The Graduate Certificate in Advanced Veterinary Nursing is designed to be completed in just over a year (part-time) and is delivered almost entirely online via the RVC's online Virtual Learning Environment (VLE), Learn.

The course begins in April 2026 and students will graduate in September of 2027. The course consists of three terms with vacation periods in the summer, winter and spring.

Methods of Teaching

The programme's teaching modules will primarily be taught online via the RVC's virtual learning environment (VLE) 'Learn'. This method of study allows students to continue to work in clinical practice, giving them the flexibility to balance their studies with their work and life commitments wherever they are in the world.

Through our VLE, Learn, students can access their learning materials on demand. The online modules also provide the opportunity for interactive activities to connect students to the RVC and their fellow CertAVN students.

The course focuses on developing critical thinking, using both theory and its practical application, enabling students to become better equipped to care for their patients and take on leadership positions within their careers.

Compulsory and optional attendance

Although for most of the course students will be online rather than on campus, we still want learners to feel very much part of the College community and make full use of the academic, support and administrative teams here to make their study as rewarding and successful as possible.

Therefore, we have added some compulsory and optional attendance days to the programme. We appreciate the challenges associated with being able to get away from work, organising childcare and the additional cost of travel with a possible overnight stay, so we have kept attendance on campus to a minimum. Wherever possible, we will also aim to provide a substitute for face-to-face attendance through online alternatives.

Modules of Study

In May of the year of entry, students must complete the pre-requisite bridging module, 'Contemporary Study Skills'.

On successful completion of this 9-week module, students are eligible to join the Core module, 'Fundamentals in Advanced Veterinary Nursing Practice'.

Students can then progress to their designation pathway units in January continuing to complete all three units from either the Anaesthesia and Analgesia or the Emergency and Critical Care or Medical Nursing modules depending on the designation pathway they have selected.

Explanation of Fees

The RVC adheres to the UK Government's legislation regarding fees for UK students which sets the maximum fee for these categories. Subject to the approval of legislation in parliament in future years, institutions including the RVC may be permitted to raise fees for UK students at an inflationary rate linked to the Retail Price Index (RPI). Therefore, we advise all UK students considering studying at the RVC to plan their finances based on such yearly inflation increases.

The fees for EU and international students are substantially higher than UK fees as the RVC receives no government subsidy or support for such students and, therefore, must charge "full cost fees". In deciding the annual increase for EU and international students, the College will consider a range of factors, including rises in the costs in delivering the teaching programs and changes in government funding. The increase will not exceed 5% yearly or the Retail Price Index (RPI), if higher. We will publish the fee in September of the preceding academic year.

EU students and Brexit

For EU students accepting a place on a programme for entry in the academic year 2026/27, your fees will now be the same as other international students, as listed above.

EU students are permitted to enter the UK. However, to stay and study for the duration of the course, they will need to apply for immigration permission either through the EU Settlement Scheme or the Student Visa route.

Additional Costs

This is predominantly an online programme and thus, there is no requirement to travel to the RVC throughout the programme.

Students coming to campus as part of the optional attendance days must cover associated costs of travel and accommodation themselves.

Other course costs are kept to a minimum but may include items such as printing/photocopying.
